

St. George's Brinsop

'Ancient Bells Set to Recover their Voices'

The vibrant community of Herefordshire's functioning bell towers is soon to get a new addition – not a high spec ring of 8 that most ringers would probably like – but the opposite end of the spectrum, just 3 bells in one of the smallest tower around..

However the three bells of St. George's Brinsop have their own claim to stardom. They are, for example, the oldest set of bells in the Herefordshire Diocese and have a rarity value in being all from the same bell founder. Fred Sharpe dated the bells to 1450 and ascribed them to Richard le Bellytere, the Worcester bell founder, who is responsible for many bells in Herefordshire.

Furthermore Mediaeval bells, we have found out, despite the rudimentary technology available at the time still set the gold standard for modern bell founders. Our bell hangers, Nicholsons' of Bridport, have stated that, 'As modern bell founders and ironsmiths, our aim is always to emulate the skills of those mediaeval craftsmen who produced bells of such fine detail and artistry'.





The Brinsop bells are fine examples of those skills. The three bells weigh 5 ½ cwt, 4 ¼ cwt and 3 ¼ cwt respectively and have diameters of 30 ½ inches, 27 3/8 inches and 25 inches. Around the sound bow a complex script spells out dedications to particular saints, St. Margaret, St. John and St. Michael asking the saints in Latin to pray for us; each letter is crowned and the words are separated with the images of the heads of King Edward 3rd or his wife Philippa of Hainhault There is also the insignia of Richard, the 4 diagonal Fleur de Lys, beginning each dedication. How all this was founded into the skin of the bell in those times is pretty amazing.

Coincidentally the saints chosen for these dedications have given us a clue as to the origin of the bells; for in 1440 one John Dansey of Turnastone married Margaret Shelwick and by this marriage inherited Brinsop Court, the local manor house which the Dansey family owned for the next 500 years. Remarkably members of the family got wind of the project to restore the bells and have been in touch, some came to launch the restoration project and others are keenly following progress.

How the bells were attached to the church and operated in the mediaeval period is uncertain but we do know they were rehung in a specially created tower when the church was restored in 1866. The original elm headstocks were kept and the bells were supplied with new locally made wheels (all one piece), new ropes tied at the top of the wheel and rollers, but no stays or slider bars.

So they will have been swung chimed. But this was clearly done with gusto as at some point the clapper in the Second came loose and was rather crudely 'repaired' with a bit of rope or cloth. It was too long though with the result that it struck the side of the bell too low so that the bell developed a serious crack which made it unringable.

The two remaining bells continued to be 'rung' by the local Gamekeeper, Evan Rogers, until 1973. He describes in his dictated biography 'A Funny Old Quist' (a must read for anyone who lives in Brinsop or who wants to know about country life in the early part of the last century, how he rung one bell with his hands and the other (through a loop lied in the rope) with his foot!



The bells have not been rung since. In the intervening years the tower became home to a colony of Jackdaws and since it is 8 metres off the ground with no convenient access it was never cleared out. So that became the first job, once we got access to the tower!

This inaccessibility of the tower has become legendary. Fred Sharpe had to have two goes at it and Henry Chandler, the current Burghill tower captain, remembers helping to renew one of the bell ropes in the 1970's and it taking them 2 hours just to get the ladder up!(He also remembers the bird litter!)

Nowadays it's still a fairly hairy climb up a scaffolding tower.

So with the recent development of techniques for welding bells, a full restoration became a possibility. The funds

were raised, the Faculty obtained, bell hangers commissioned and the bells were removed from the tower. The Second has been welded by Soundweld, the cast in crown staples have been drilled out, the bells have been provided with new headstocks, new wheels, stays and slider bars and a new metal frame too as the C19th one was found to be rotten in places.

This week the bells and frame have returned to the church to be re-introduced into the tower and set up for full circle ringing from the floor of the nave. If all goes well, these ancient bells will be able to find their voice again after all these years. Everyone in Brinsop is hoping they don't sound too bad!
